Housing and Human Services

This month our spotlight is on the City of Irving's Housing and Human Services (HHS) Department, whose purpose is "to help our community by providing housing and infrastructure improvements, social services partnerships and quality of life enhancements." Under the leadership of Director Steve Reed and Assistant Director Vicki Ebner. they are also guided by a board which consists of nine Irving residents. On their web page, you can find a variety of innovative programs designed to assist Irving's low and moderate income residents. Among these are three US Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Grants which are administered through the HHS Department, which are:

- Community Development Block Grants (CDBG)
- Emergency Solution Grants
- Home Investment Partnership Grants

These grants can greatly improve the quality of life for those who qualify, and the HHS staff will be happy to help residents in determining their eligibility.



The ribbon cutting at La Buena Vida House, held on November 10, was well-attended by community leaders as they welcomed the facility to Irving.

The city also offers a Home Restoration and an Emergency Repair program, as well as an Accessibility Program for senior or disabled residents to alleviate mobility concerns.

HHS played a big role in the recent revitalization of Tudor Lane, where multi-family units that had fallen into disrepair were replaced with single-family, energy-efficient homes. They offered assistance for first

time home buyers who now call Tudor Lane their home. They have a new neighbor in "La Buena Vida House," a facility for homeless teen and young adult males who are enrolled in Irving ISD schools. They also hope to have a home like this for young female students in similar situations, to help them succeed in both school and life.
