## GCAA LANDSCAPE AWARD PROJECTS COMPLETED

Irving won the 2010 Governor's Community Achievement Award from Keep Texas Beautiful, and received the largest prize amount ever awarded, a \$310,000 landscaping grant from the Texas Department of Transportation. This recognized our community as having one of the best grassroots environmental programs in the state. Through the partnership of the City of Irving, TXDoT, and KIB, the results of that award can now be seen as you enter the city from both the east and west ends of Irving Boulevard. Two mustang gateway signs, complete with native trees, grasses and flowers, have been completed. The sign below acknowledges that partnership that should make all Irving residents very proud of their accomplishments.
