This relationship goes back many years, when they were known as VHA. After a merger with UHC Hospital Networks, and a name change, Vizient is the largest memberowned health care company in the nation, headquartered right here in Irving. They have made giving back to the community a core value of their company, and since 2002 they have held an event called "Community Day." This is an annual day of service in Vizient offices across the country, originally started with funds redirected from the company Christmas party to support this day of giving back. KIB has been a part of the Irving office's Community Day since 2009, serving as one of the host organizations that provide service projects. Over the years, teams from Vizient, usually consisting of about 25 employee volunteers, have revitalized several Parks and Recreation Centers, including Senter, Fritz, Running Bear and Lively Pointe. KIB staff works closely with team leaders to find a suitable project, and many of the Vizient volunteers sign up to be on the KIB team year after year. Planning is already underway for this year's project coming up in October.

Vizient employees volunteer throughout the year in a variety of activities. These include sewing blankets for soldiers, helping with the Real School Garden program, working at the North Texas Food Bank, delivering

Meals on Wheels, and teaching at local schools through the Junior Achievement program. Not only do they volunteer in the community, but they also encourage eco-friendly practices in the office, like reducing office waste with double-sided printing, ink recycling and using recycled paper. They hold an annual "Recycle Week" where they shred and recycle paper, and lead a "Healthier Hospital" initiative to educate their member hospitals about reducing their environmental impact.

Vizient also serves as a year-round sponsor for KIB programs, and have been very generous in their support. A big thanks to Vizient and their empljuoyees for all they do, at the global headquarters here in Irving and at their locations across the country.

Did You Know?

Each year in the US, 50 billion plastic water bottles are used, but only 23% are recycled. But if they are, here's what happens to them:

- PET plastics (#1, like water bottles) are washed, sterilized, chopped and baled
- The plastic is heated until pliable
- This sticky plastic is fed through a machine which turns it to thread that is wound around a spool
- Spools of yarn are dyed, then fed into a machine that makes bolts of cloth
- This cloth is purchase by manufacturers who make clothing from it.
