Discover Irving's Many Parks and Trails

Covering over 2,000 acres of land, Irving's 43 parks offer a variety of activities for residents and other visitors to enjoy year-round. We have the Parks and Recreation Department and their hard-working staff members to thank for taking such good care of these parks. Keep Irving Beautiful and the Parks staff work closely together to provide our partners opportunities to serve the community by volunteering their time in painting, planting and cleanup projects. The Parks team always has the designated area reserved and ready for our volunteers, providing supplies, guidance and knowledge. This is especially evident during tree planting projects at the Tree Farm, where volunteers learn that there is much more to planting a tree than just putting it in the ground. They come away with skills in proper root preparation, mulching, watering and tree maintenance, and a great appreciation for our Parks staff.

KIB often holds cleanups at parks located on the Campi3n Trails, a 22-mile greenbelt with 12-foot wide concrete trails along the Elm and West Forks of

the Trinity River. They will eventually link to a regional trail system, with the most recent connection being to Grand Prairie's Lone Star Trail. As part of the city's eco-tourism program, they offer an abundance of plant and animal life, and are an important part of Irving's history as river crossing areas for pioneers heading west in the 1800s. Several of the northern parks are closed until the high waters from spring flooding recede, but the south trails are open and ready to enjoy! Did You Know?

Our Earth 911 tips this month have to do with conserving water in your yard/garden:

- Use soaker hoses: Purchase or make your own by punching small holes every 6 inches and capping the end of the hose
- Collect rainwater: You can learn to make your own rain barrel by taking a city-sponsored class
- Re-purpose wasted kitchen water: Collect any water you run while waiting for it to get hot and use it
- Mulch the soil: This keeps the sun from drying our the soil too fast.
